The Order for Evening Prayer according to the Book of Common Prayer

INTRODUCTORY NOTE

The Book of Common Prayer (BCP) is largely the work of Thomas Cranmer, Archbishop of Canterbury, who started compiling it in the reign of Henry VIII, and then continued under his son Edward VI. It dates from 1549, and was written in English, some 60 years before the King James Bible.

The protestant movement had started in 1517 when Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses to the door of his church in Germany. But until Henry VIII established the Church of England all services were conducted in Latin. Cranmer set about compiling a book which would set out how every service should be conducted in English. By 'every' he meant 'every' – from baptisms, marriages and funerals to the ordination of priests and bishops; from daily services to Holy Communion. He set out readings so that the Old Testament was read through once a year and the New Testament three times a year. He also compiled collects (short prayers) for every Sunday in the church calendar.

The daily services of Matins and Evensong were derived from the many services of prayer which had punctuated the days and nights of the medieval church and its monasteries. In addition, Cranmer included the book of Psalms. Psalms which express hopes and fears, inspire faith, and renew trust in God. The current version of the BCP was finalised in 1622 during the reign of James I

In order to enter into the spirit of these services we need to do two things. First, we have to be patient and relaxed enough to allow a long and muchloved tradition to have its say. Then we should allow our own thoughts and feelings to become closer to us than life often admits.

These two things are not separate. Along with much that is now unfamiliar, the tradition includes strong expressions of our basic feelings about ourselves and God. And it is precisely the cool and ancient order of the services which can both prompt and structure reflection on our regrets and hopes and gratitudes. The best analogy for this is a relation of love, in which by attending to someone else we find ourselves. So let us pray that through these beautiful services we may learn more about the love of God for his world, his people and each one of us.

BIDDING PRAYER

DEARLY beloved brethren, the Scripture moveth us, in sundry places, to acknowledge and confess our manifold sins and wickedness; and that we should not dissemble nor cloak them before the face of Almighty God our heavenly Father; but confess them with an humble, lowly, penitent, and obedient heart; to the end that we may obtain forgiveness of the same, by his infinite goodness and mercy. And although we ought, at all times, humbly to acknowledge our sins before God; yet ought we chiefly so to do, when we assemble and meet together to render thanks for the great benefits that we have received at his hands, to set forth his most worthy praise, to hear his most holy Word, and to ask those things which are requisite and necessary, as well for the body as the soul. Wherefore I pray and beseech you, as many as are here present, to accompany me with a pure heart, and humble voice, unto the throne of the heavenly grace, saying after me;

GENERAL CONFESSION

Please sit or kneel

ALMIGHTY and most merciful Father; We have erred, and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep. We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts. We have offended against thy holy laws. We have left undone those things which we ought to have done; And we have done those things which we ought not to have done; And there is no health in us. But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us, miserable offenders. Spare thou them, O God, who confess their faults. Restore thou those who are penitent; According to thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesu our Lord. And grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake; That we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, To the glory of thy holy Name. Amen.

THE ABSOLUTION

ALMIGHTY God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desireth not the death of a sinner, but rather that he may turn from his wickedness, and live; and hath given power, and commandment, to his Ministers, to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the Absolution and Remission of their sins: He pardoneth and absolveth all them that truly repent, and unfeignedly believe his holy Gospel. Wherefore let us beseech him to grant us true repentance, and his Holy Spirit, that those things may please him, which we do at this present; and that the rest of our life hereafter may be pure, and holy; so that at the last we may come to his eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

LORD'S PRAYER
